THE BENEFITS OF WINTER GUARD

The benefits students derive from being in a winter guard are innumerable.

EXPERIENCES THAT MOLD THE STUDENTS' FUTURE

- Students experience a "community" of peers all focused on a positive common goal.
- > Students learn about commitment.
- > Students learn that competition is a means to set new standards and they learn to push themselves to meet and try to surpass those standards.
- Students learn to respect their competitive peers and grow from that experience.
- > Students learn how to cope with situations that sometimes don't feel "fair" and they learn how to turn that experience into motivation for growth.
- Students learn the art of communication to others through performance.
- Students develop the self- confidence to tackle tough tasks and see them through to completion.

- > Students benefit physically from the training and demands placed on them through movement, dance and prop manipulation.
- > Students build endurance through expanded rehearsal and training programs.

WGI Mourns the Passing of Fred J. Miller

WGI mourns the passing of Fred J. Miller, a master showman of the pageantry arts and integral force of the indoor color guard and percussion activity. A resident of Centerville, Ohio, he was born on March 6, 1932, the son of Orville and Betty Miller. He passed away today, August 3, 2012, at the age of 80.

A lifetime resident of the Dayton area, Fred graduated from Chaminade High School in 1952 and attended the University of Dayton. He was the Director of Bands at Fairborn High School from 1957 to 1968, eventually serving as Music Supervisor for the district. His theatrical skills were evident by directing ten of the most popular musicals in the district's history.

Mr. Miller was a founding member of the United States Twirling Association and founded the Miller's Blackhawks Twirling Corps establishing a record unequalled in the twirling world by winning national championships every year from 1956 through 1968.

The next evolution of the Miller's Blackhawks was to enter the color guard world becoming one of the most memorable and impressive groups of the 80's and 90's. The Blackhawks personified Fred's dedication to excellence, showmanship and sense of family. The guard earned a silver medal in only their second appearance at the world championships in the newly created A Class in 1980. This was followed by a move into the highest class of competition and receiving the bronze medal in 1985, 1986 and 1989 and a coveted silver medal in 1987 for their memorable "Colors" show.

Fred J. Miller was also crucial to the development of a young WGI in the early 80's. He served as Treasurer for many years even personally guaranteeing financial solvency when times were lean for the new organization. Fred was also the President and Chief Executive Officer of Fred J. Miller, Inc., a family owned company established by Fred and his wife, Marlene, and was the first sponsor of Winter Guard International, leading the way as usual.

After the 1982 championships, Mr. Miller was crucial in opening doors in Dayton, Ohio, to bring the event to his home city. He was the foundation for the relationship with the city and the arena of his alma mater, University of Dayton. His legacy will forever be entwined with the University of Dayton Arena, home to the WGI World Championships for the past 27 years.

Fred J. Miller was inducted into the WGI Hall of Fame in 1995 as recognition as an enthusiastic and crucial catalyst in the development of the internationally recognized organization WGI had become because of his efforts.

"It's impossible to picture a world without Fred J. Miller in it," said WGI Executive Director Ron Nankervis. "There are no words that can adequately express how sad a day this is to lose someone who has touched countless lives. He will be missed at every gathering of twirling, marching band, drum corps and especially indoor color guard and percussion enthusiasts forever."

Fred J. Miller leaves his beloved wife of 53 years, Marlene, and his devoted family of daughter, Mary Lynn Dorow, and sons Mark and Mike Miller along with their spouses and eight grandchildren.
